Great grandmother Grace wins two gold medals in South Korea – aged 87 - some 67 years after finishing 8th in the Olympics

Remarkable Grace Isaacs has just won two gold medals, two bronze and a fourth place in the World Masters in South Korea after 80 years of swimming. She fought off a heavy cold and soaring temperatures to achieve the feat. She said: "I had a cold but persevered through it. I had a great time."

She has three children, seven grandchildren and five great children. She told our Jill Dando reporters: "I was born with a gift to swim." She showed our reporters her medals and newspaper cuttings of when she met the Queen.

She finished eighth in the world after getting to the semifinals of the 1952 Helsinki Olympics, and finishing second in the whole of Europe and was third fastest in the world. Afterwards she met the Queen on two occasions who passed on her congratulations.

Their amazing success came as WCSA students again celebrate another set of brilliant GCSE results.


Some 13% of students achieved grades 9-7, while 44% scored grades 9-5, and 67% had grades 9-4.

He was with us for over an hour and a half, letting us watch the interviews he did for TV with Sky, BBC and other channels and even signed autographs - I got two, one for my sister. I gave him the latest copy of The Post and he said goodbye.

We were shown out and allowed to take loads of photos outside Number 10.

I felt so cool as hardly any people get to experience what I did; I vowed walking out of Downing Street that I would be back!

Britain's number one TV woman Fiona Bruce talks to our Jill Dando reporters about Jill, journalism and her life tips for kids.

How important is positive news at this time? Do you think people want to hear more good news rather than bad?

People probably do want to hear more good news than bad some of the time, the news can be a depressing litany of political division, cruelty and war. But journalists have a responsibility to tell the unvarnished truth about what is happening and much of the time it's not good. The difficulty is trying to strike the right balance.

How was Jill Dando an influence on your life and future career?

Jill was someone I looked up to and admired very much. She blazed a trail for presenters to be themselves (is not overly formal) and to work across serious and lighter types of programmes.

What was it about Jill Dando that was so special?

Jill had a unique warmth and genuine way with the camera. She seemed utterly herself and at ease and that's not an easy thing to be when you're surrounded by a camera crew. It might be the fifth time you've tried to get your words right, it's been a long day and

your shoes are giving you blisters - you get the general idea . And she came across as someone you'd like to be your friend- I never met anyone who had a bad word to say about her.

What is the best story you have ever done?

I don't think I could name just one. But I'd say that in news, the most exciting stories for me are when you have access to big events. Being at number 10 when a new prime minister is announced, being at the Olympic stadium for the 2012 Olympics, being at Dunkirk for the anniversary of the World War Two evacuation, being outside Buckingham Palace for the Golden Jubilee - and many more.

If you were 13 years old again, would you choose journalism again and would you do anything differently?

I would definitely choose journalism as it's a job where no day is ever the same but every day is interesting . And no, I don't think I would do anything differently.

What do you think Jill would be doing today in journalism?

I'm sure she would be a BBC1 superstar and the most popular woman on television.

Do you have any life tips for children growing up in today's world?

I hesitate to suggest life tips as life is so different for children today. I would only say; believe in yourself, always try your hardest (it will become a habit that pays off in the long run!) and read books, newspapers, anything - just read. Your articulacy, your ability to write, construct an argument, fight your corner will all be improved by it!
